A Resounding, Yes!

Moving through the season of Lent, our thoughts turn once again toward the cross. There's no way to avoid it, really; it's always there behind us and it stands before us, telling its gruesome story of humanity's folly and foolishness, its madness and sin. It's the story of our refusal to receive the presence and love and justice of God. God sent the Son in love and we said, "No." And God continues to send the Son to humanity, and our response is often still the same, "No." The human No to God emerges out of the brokenness of the human condition, what the Bible often describes as sin. Sin is essentially separation and alienation. It's a ferocious

force within us and in the world that desires to alienate and separate us from ourselves, our neighbor, and God. I was recently reminded that the Greek word *diabolos*, often translated as "devil," literally means "to divide in two." Sin is a diabolical power that divides and dehumanizes us and tries to destroy and distort our sense of God's image within us.

The events of Palm Sunday, Holy Week, and Easter morning, together, declare that the power of sin is no match for the greater love of God. In her work *Christ the Key* (Cambridge University Press, 2010), Kathryn Tanner, professor of theology at Yale Divinity School, reminds us: "Sin has no power to break God's faithfulness to God's own original intentions for us; we are still in God's eyes at least the creatures God created us to be." The good news of Easter morning is that nothing, not even sin, has the power to separate us from God's love (Romans 8:38-39).

Somehow—in ways that remain baffling and mysterious, and yet are true—God entered into and engaged this dreadful power within us and, in love, redeemed it and transformed it. Martin Laird, Roman Catholic writer and contemplative, says it best, "God in Christ has taken into [God]self the brokenness of the human condition. Hence, human woundedness, brokenness, death itself are transformed from dead ends to doorways into Life" (*Into the Silent Land: A Guide to the Christian Practice of Contemplation* Oxford University Press, 2006). In the Eastern Orthodox tradition, this process of transformation, this ongoing work of the Holy Spirit (as we explored

in adult ed on March 24) is called *theosis* or divinization or deification. As Laird writes, "In the divinizing humanity of Christ, bruises become balm." The good news of Easter morning makes the miraculous claim that the resurrected humanity of Christ is now at work transforming our humanity, restoring the distorted image of God within us.

To put it a different way, what we celebrate on Easter morning (and every Sunday, for every Sunday is a mini-Easter) is the resurrection as God's resounding, eternal "Yes!" to humanity's incessant "No!" The Yes! of resurrection is God's last and final word to everyone and everything that tries to shut down or shut out God's inexorable desire to love and redeem and make whole.

This is how the apostle Paul understood the cross and empty tomb, this is what he saw at work in Christ's death and resurrection. "For the Son of God, Jesus Christ, whom we proclaimed among you...was not 'Yes and No.' For in him every one of God's promises is a 'Yes.' For this reason it is through him that we say the 'Amen,' to the glory of God" (2 Cor. 1:19,20).

God reaches out to say Yes to all human beings in Jesus Christ. The good news we proclaim is that God is bound to us, faithful to us—no matter what—and holds us, as the old hymn says, with a love that will never let us go. So let us, then, respond with a resounding, *Yes!* and *Amen!* Saying, Yes, with our hearts and with our lives to the One who says to us, Yes. ✚

Learning to “Undesign the Redline”

On February 26, a dozen members and friends of Catonsville Presbyterian’s “Dismantling Racism” group had a guided tour of the “Undesign the Redline” exhibit display at the Central Branch of the Howard County Public Library. This traveling exhibit, developed by the organization, “[Designing the We](#),” shows how racism and classism become part of our society’s structure through processes like “redlining.”

Redlining History

Redlining started back in 1934 as a program of the newly formed Federal Housing Administration (FHA). The FHA asked the Home Owners Loan Corporation (HOLC) to create “residential security maps” of more than 200 cities. Those maps color coded neighborhoods based on how desirable they would be for real estate investment. Type A neighborhoods were affluent and growing and color coded “green.” Type B were “blue” and slightly less desirable but growing in affluence. Type C were “yellow” and areas in decline. Type D neighborhoods were undesirable and coded “red” due to high percentages of certain types of immigrants and Blacks. Those neighborhoods were considered “redlined” and received limited investment. This resulted in those populations being starved of infrastructure such as public transportation, businesses, and quality schools. It also led to predatory lending practices in those neighborhoods which kept residents from accumulating wealth through home ownership.



Unique Tour Aspects

Participants on the tour learned not only about redlining, but the many other forces, frequently created by government initiatives, that have built up institutional racism in the US since the early 19th century. The tour then took a closer look at how those forces have influenced the populations in Howard County and Baltimore. Tour goers had an opportunity to see the residential security maps for Baltimore and observe how the racial boundaries established by redlining remain etched in the current neighborhoods of Baltimore and its suburbs.

Perhaps one of the most unique aspects of the tour was the invitation by individuals to write down their thoughts on the exhibit and post them on the display. People commented on their shock over learning the history displayed, but also suggested ideas on how to “undesign” the redline and dismantle the structures that continue to prop up racism in our communities. We all recognized the need to continue to learn, to teach others and, most importantly, to act to help heal the wounds of racism and work to confront and dismantle racism in all its forms. Session Meeting Highlights

The Session is a body of fifteen members, elected by the Congregation and ordained as ruling elders, who provide leadership for our congregation. Following are highlights of the regular monthly Session meeting of March 13, 2019.

■ The Finance Committee reported that the strong start to the year has continued, with an \$18,271 surplus of income over expenses for the year through February 28, 2019. This is largely due to prepayments of some pledges for the full year. The Committee plans to work with the Stewardship Committee during the year to increase the percentage of members who pledge to support the church.

■ The Mission Committee is sponsoring a mission trip by congregation members to repair hurricane damage in Puerto Rico. So far, response for the trip is strong, and the week of November 11, 2019 has been tentatively selected. The Committee plans activities and other ways for the congregation to support the trip, for those who cannot go along.

■ Session approved the Mission Committee's request to award \$13,000 in Grace Mission Fund donations to the following causes: Larry Sthreshley, Presbyterian Church (USA) mission co-worker in the Congo, Catonsville Emergency Assistance, Bridges to Housing Stability, Lazarus Caucus (Westside Shelter), Baltimore Seafarers Center, LWR-IMA (IMCK Hospital), and the LWR-IMA general fund.

■ A meeting of prospective new members is planned by the Outreach Committee for March 30, 2019. The new members class will be welcomed into the congregation at worship on May 12, 2019.

■ Session received a presentation from the Columbarium Committee, and approved proceeding with the proposed location on the lawn between the handicapped access ramp and Beechwood Avenue. The design uses a low wall to house the columbarium niches, and the details will be consistent with the architecture of the Beechwood steps and the church building.

■ The Website Design Team announced that the new Catonsville Presbyterian website will be introduced to the congregation during worship on March 31, 2019. A soft launch is planned leading up to the full launch, using selected members and friends to preview the website for evaluation purposes. Feedback will be given to the design team to finalize the design before the formal launch.

Session recognizes the need to continually communicate with our membership, and we welcome your suggestions for communication exchange. Session member contact information is listed in the Church Directory, so it is easy to communicate directly with your church leaders. Take a few minutes to send a message to a Session member, the pastors, or the church office, and let us know what you think. We want to hear from you!

Fall Puerto Rico Work Trip

The Mission Committee is encouraged by the interest of Catonsville Presbyterian members to participate in a trip to Puerto Rico this fall to help with the rebuilding after the devastation brought to the island by Hurricane Maria in 2017. Over 30 people attended the recent lunch program with guest speaker David Myers from Presbyterian Disaster Assistance to learn about disaster recovery work in Puerto Rico and the role of work teams. An organizing team is being formed now among those interested in traveling as well as others who are willing to support the work team here at home. The Mission Committee has set aside some of the Grace Mission Funds and has received the Session's endorsement to move forward with a work trip this fall.

The Catonsville Presbyterian work team will travel on Monday, November 11, 2019, which is Veteran's Day, for at least one week with an option to extend. The newly formed organizing team will now develop a project budget, finalize the travel dates and PDA host and work site in order to begin trip registration and fund raising. Travel scholarships will be included within the budget so as not to limit participation of those who are interested and otherwise able.

During the lunch discussion on March 10, David Myers encouraged us to think seriously about the attitude and motivation that shapes our interest in such a trip. He reminded us that in the history of US Government relations with the island of Puerto Rico there has been a lot of pain and brokenness. He challenged us to acknowledge our own blindness to Puerto Rico's history and rich cultural heritage, to go knowing that there will be differences from our "mainland" U.S. culture. It is in this context, that Puerto Rico is rebuilding from the worst hurricane damage in their history, making rebuilding in every aspect of life, physical, social, economic and spiritual, very slow. He, therefore, recommends all work groups to go with a high degree of flexibility to what they will do once they arrive and how they will work with the local partners. PDA has a number of practical resources to help us plan the trip and educate our congregation. LWR-IMA World Health Project

The Mission Committee is working with Melanie Gibbons, Lutheran World Relief and Jennifer Bentzel, IMA World Health to coordinate a kit project in early June. Details are being worked out, but this is one of several kit projects used by Lutheran World Relief in various places. Since the merger of these two relief agencies, we are pleased to let you know that Catonsville Presbyterian is considered a valued partner to this new group.

We will be working to provide Personal Care Kits for people whose homes have been destroyed by natural disasters or for those who have fled for their safety often without anything besides what they are wearing. The kits will contain one towel, two or three bars of bath soap, an adult sized toothbrush, a sturdy comb, and a metal nail clipper. Toothpaste will be added at the site where they are distributed. The kits are rolled and tied with ribbon or yarn. Each kit will probably cost about \$10.

Mission committee is pricing the bulk purchase of several of these items, but will ask for donations of other items. We have learned that Salem Lutheran has also provided these kits at various time, so it is a "tried and true" project. Knowing that refugees can be found in many countries due to a wide variety of reasons, it's also a much needed project. Watch for additional information and dates for collection of items, sponsorship for kits, and a final date for the assembly of the kits. This will be our first LWR IMA World Health project and we look forward to your enthusiastic support.
