Founded in 1999 as the Catonsville Presbyterian Concert Series, "Catonsville Concerts at 3" is now entering its 21st season of presenting high-quality, live musical performances free of charge for Catonsville and the surrounding community. While our series is part of the ministry of Catonsville Presbyterian Church, it is financially independent of the church, relying on several grants and donations from our audiences for support. Originally the focus was classical chamber, however in recent years Catonsville Concerts at 3 has expanded to include folk, jazz, and bluegrass fusion in the musical genres presented, and thereby expanded its appeal and its audience base significantly. Mindfulness practice has become widespread in society. More and more people are turning to this ancient spiritual technique of "being present." But why? In the documentary, *Mindfulness Goes Mainstream*, produced by public television station WGBH Boston (2017), we will hear from scholars, researchers, and actual practitioners of mindfulness. They document and testify to the benefits accrued by living more mindfully. Some of the outcomes include overall health and well-being, reduction of stress and anxiety, enhancement of performance and focus, and more compassion and empathy toward others. Session Meeting Highlights

The Session is a body of fifteen members, elected by the congregation and ordained as ruling elders, who provide leadership for our congregation. Following are highlights of the regular monthly Session meeting of August 7, 2019.

■ The Finance Committee is undertaking a reorganization of the Balance Sheet accounts in the church financial system in order to simplify the system, provide more accountability, and in hopes of reducing the number of dormant accounts. Each Balance Sheet account will now be the responsibility of a board or committee.

■ The Finance Committee also reported that the church has a deficit of \$3500 in income versus expenses for the year to date, and we must remember that the annual budget predicts a shortfall, so members are urged to bring their pledges up to date following the summer months.

■ The Session approved the Mission Committee's recommendation to award funds from the Grace Mission Fund to the following causes:

■ The Santi School in Nepal, for their teacher training program.

■ LWR/IMA for assistance with the ebola epidemic in the Democratic Republic of Congo.

■ Asylee Women Enterprises, assisting migrants seeking asylum in the U.S.

■ The Mission Committee will also sponsor a lunch in the fall for the volunteers going on the Puerto Rico Recovery trip.

■ The Session continued its conversation about reviewing and evaluating the Envision Fund after the first five years of operation of the Fund. The Fund has been a great

success, disbursing over \$500,000 to worthwhile causes locally, nationally, and internationally. After discussion, Session agreed to form a task force to review the Envision Fund and advise any recommendations for its ongoing operation. The task force will include representatives from Session, the Envision Board, and the congregation-at-large.

■ The Dismantling Racism group, which has been meeting for some months discussing ways to combat racism in our community, requested approval from Session to host a "Bystander Intervention" training event at our church, in conjunction with several other local churches. The training would be conducted by the Montgomery County Civil Rights Commission, and would help attendees learn skills to help de-escalate situations where individuals are being harassed for their race, gender, ethnicity, religion, or sexual orientation. Session enthusiastically approved the request.

Session recognizes the need to continually communicate with our membership, and we welcome your suggestions for communication exchange. Session member contact information is listed in the Church Directory, so it is easy to communicate directly with your church leaders. Take a few minutes to send a message to a Session member, the pastors, or the church office, and let us know what you think. Ann Quinn and Ann Bracken will read from their collections of poetry dealing with memories whose power has shaped them and influenced their writing journeys. Come for an inspiring evening of poetry and conversation with two local authors.

Church member Ann Quinn, who has led a bi-monthly Writer's Group at Catonsville Presbyterian for the past five years, is a poet and essayist, editor, teacher, mentor, mother, and classical clarinetist. In her poetry collection, *Final Deployment*, published by Finishing Line Press, the child of a Vietnam War naval aviator matures into motherhood and experiences the death of her own mother. These poems remind us of what nature teaches about death's necessity and its potential for transfiguration. Ann's award-winning work has been published in *Potomac Review*, *Little Patuxent Review*, *Vietnam War Poetry*, *Haibun Today*, and *Snapdragon*, and is included in the anthology *Red Sky: Poetry on the Global Epidemic of Violence Against Women*. She conducts writing workshops and music camps, volunteers in schools and libraries, and plays in a symphony orchestra.
