Join us for a viewing of the award-winning documentary produced by the Presbyterian Church (USA). Trigger frames gun violence as a "disaster" and "public health" issue. It examines how one shooting impacts individuals, families and communities and gives voice to the questions and insights that arise. In the documentary, all those scarred by gun violence arrived at the question, "Why did this happen to us?" After looking at these in depth experiences of gun violence, Trigger turns its attention to the bigger question, "What can we do to prevent gun violence?"

### **NOVEMBER 24**

### Poetry as Prayer

In the words of moderately successful poet Ellen McGrath Smith, "Poetry is marginal, thankless, untethered from fame and fortune; it's also gut level, urgent, private yet yearning for connection. In all these ways, it's like prayer for me. I'm a not-quite-lapsed Catholic with Zen leanings, but I'll always pray—and I'll always write poems. Writing hasn't brought me the Poetry Jackpot I once pursued, but it draws on the same inner wiring that flickers when I pray." In this session, moderately successful poet Ann Quinn will lead us learning how we can enrich our prayer lives both by using the poems of others in prayerful contemplation, and also by writing our own prayerful poetry. No prior poetry experience required!

# Bystander Intervention Training Class

Sunday, November 3

On Sunday, November 3, community partners will offer a free Bystander Intervention Training at Catonsville Presbyterian Church. This comprehensive training, facilitated by trainers from the Montgomery County Civil Rights Coalition, provides a grounding in the principles of nonviolence and de-escalation, followed by interactive scenarios to practice new skills. Participants will learn how to manage group dynamics that can arise from bias-motivated harassment. They will also learn how to confidently and compassionately facilitate bystander skills. The training provides an orientation to the history and philosophy of nonviolence and bystander intervention and teaches intervention skills through mock scenarios worked out in small groups. By the end of this training participants will understand the background and principles of de-escalation, they will have actively improved intervention skills, and will have greater courage to step into a variety of difficult situations as a bystander.

In a time when we can all feel powerless against the seemingly incessant stream of racist and bigoted rhetoric and actions in our community, this training is an opportunity to provide individuals with tools to effectively and safely counter the divisive forces. For the next few Sundays there will be volunteers at a table in fellowship hall to receive your donations of either food or money to assist the missionaries of Grace AME Church in fulfilling this much needed outreach in the community of Catonsville. With every donation you will be able to sign your name to a feather and place in on the turkey, which on November 15, will be presented to the missionaries as a symbol of our continued partnership with this wonderful church. There will also be the opportunity to sign up to fill the bags at Grace AME on Winters Lane on Friday, November 15, at 4 p.m. to distribute the turkeys and fixings on Saturday, November 16, at 9 a.m..

### **Creation Care News**

This has been both a challenging and a rewarding season of earth-care projects! The native plant gardens around the Church House and garage continue to thrive. This fall we added a new conservation landscape garden adjacent to the labyrinth, enhancing rain-water management as well as making this place more pleasant and welcoming for personal and small group meditation and gathering.

The woodland sanctuary and meadows continue to be transformed from an overgrown and unusable place. Now ending the third year of development, it is becoming a place where pollinators and other little creatures find welcoming habitats as well as a place for the congregation and community to go for quiet meditation, learning, fun, and gardening. We have planted hundreds of flowering native plants, hundreds of square feet of native grasses, many new native trees and shrubs, and are developing demonstration areas for a variety of habitats. Soon you will see new birdhouses placed throughout, built and installed by the church's middle school youth. The chipped wood paths lead you into the woods from either Summit Ave or the main parking lot. Look for the welcoming, sanctuary signs!

Unfortunately, we have recently lost six of our largest and most majestic trees. The toll of weather and age has weakened and stressed trees all over Catonsville. As we have removed trees, we have been planting replacements and have plans for more as funding becomes available. Working with local companies, much of the wood from the trees that have come down is being repurposed as furniture and firewood. The Creation Care Team closely coordinates with the Trustees to keep our property safe, esthetic, and environmentally sustainable!

We continue to be greatly helped by the generosity of the congregation and community. We also have benefitted the past four years from successfully applying for grant support from the Chesapeake Bay Trust, BGE/Exelon Green Grants, and Baltimore Presbytery's West Side Story group. Grant funding to date has totaled over \$30,000, with the majority going for the woodlands transformation projects! # Session Meeting Highlights

The Session is a body of fifteen members, elected by the congregation and ordained as ruling elders, who provide leadership for our congregation. Following are highlights of the regular monthly Session meeting of October 2, 2019.

- The Session approved a request from the Mission Committee to authorize up to \$2,000 from GRACE Mission Fund income to be spent for building supplies for the Puerto Rico work project. This will be used by our mission team to repair damage caused by the 2017 hurricanes in Puerto Rico. Session also approved the Committee's request to donate \$500 of GRACE Fund income to CWS/CROP, since we did not participate CROP Walk in Catonsville this year.
- The Finance Committee is investigating the introduction of a capital budget for the church to supplement the existing annual operating budget. A capital budget would formalize the process of earmarking and allocating funds to be made available for large, one-time projects, as opposed to routine, ongoing expenses like maintenance, utilities, and etc. This will be a subject for discussion at future meetings.
- The Christian Education Committee announced that it intends to develop a "safe sanctuary" policy to protect children and youth involved in church programs from sexual predators and other forms of abuse. The policy

will be designed in accordance with PC(USA) policy.

Our Elder Commissioners reported on the recent meeting of Baltimore Presbytery, at which the future of "The Center" was discussed. The Center is a Presbytery program providing housing and guidance for church groups engaged in urban mission projects in Baltimore. A proposal for The Center's future will be presented at the next Presbytery gathering in November, and a vote on the proposal will be taken at the following gathering in February 2020.

Session recognizes the need to continually communicate with our membership, and we welcome your suggestions for communication exchange. Session member contact information is listed in the Church Directory, so it is easy to communicate directly with your church leaders. Take a few minutes to send a message to a Session member, the pastors, or the church office, and let us know what you think. We want to hear from you!
