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

On a Tree

ntil his death in 2018, James H. Cone was the Bill and Judith Moyers Distinguished Professor of Systematic Theology at Union Theological Seminary in New York City. He was the author of seminal works in the fields of theology and race, such as *A Black Theology of Liberation* (1970) and *God of the Oppressed* (1975). Before his arrival in 1969, Union had not accepted a black student to its doctoral program since its founding in 1836. During his career at Union, Cone supervised

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more than forty doctoral students. It's difficult to measure the enormous reach of Cone's scholarship and his influence upon the witness of the church as a whole. He was the founder of an entire school of thought, Black liberation theology.

Several years ago, in National Capital Presbytery, Dorothy and I had the privilege of listening to Cone speak about writing his book *The Cross* and the Lynching Tree (Orbis Books, 2013). Cone shared that this was his most important and, perhaps, most personal work. In this provocative and moving text, the image or symbol of the cross as a tree ("They put him to death by hanging him on a tree" Acts 10:39) is placed alongside the image or symbol of the lynching tree. This juxtaposition allows one to mutually inform, define, and even illumine the other. "The cross and the lynching tree are the two most emotionally charged symbols in the history of the African American community. ...Both the cross and the lynching tree represent the worst in human beings and at the same time a thirst for life that refuses to let the worst determine our final meaning."

I often return to Cone's text around this time each year as we begin to reflect again on the meaning of the cross. Sometimes, the church talks too glibly about Jesus' suffering on the cross. We sentimentalize the symbol. We assume too much by claiming we know what the cross means or that we know what God was doing in and

through the death of Jesus Christ. "The gospel of Jesus is not a rational concept," Cone suggests, "to be explained in a theory of salvation, but a story about God's presence in Jesus' solidarity with the oppressed, which led to his death on the cross. What is redemptive is the faith that God snatches victory out of defeat, life out of death, and hope out of despair." The cross was and remains a powerful symbol that reveals God's radical, even subversive grace; it both judges the depths of human sin and proclaims God's redemptive love that makes whole all that is broken within us and within the world. "The cross is a paradoxical religious symbol," Cone says, "because it inverts the world's value system with the news that hope comes by way of defeat, that suffering and death do not have the last word, that the last shall be first and the first last."

Without being sentimental about it, on Sunday mornings, as well on Thursday mornings, through the season of Lent, we will turn again to the meaning of the cross for our times. Paul tells us, "For God was in Christ, reconciling the world to [God's] self (2 Cor. 5:19), and so we have been given the responsibility of both conveying this message and embodying it in our lives. It's a ministry, a way of life, that bears witness to the power of reconciliation. And so, what does this really mean for us today?

The Thursday Morning Bible Study group will take up something new this Lent. Our text will be *The Sign and The Sacrifice: The Meaning of the Cross and Resurrection* (Westminster John Knox Press, 2016), by Rowan Williams, former archbishop of Canterbury and one of the leading theologians of our day. We will be looking at key passages in scripture that bear witness to the Jesus' death and resurrection. We'll explore what these events meant to Jesus' followers in the early years and what they can say to us today. Join us for some serious theological engagement. The books will be available for sale and cost \$9. We begin the study on February 27, 2020, at 10:30 a.m., in the library.



Inauguration of PAX Women's Center



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Answering God's Call to Environmental Justice By Alex Hall

Climate change can be a difficult subject to wrestle with. It threatens to have a profound negative impact on all of God's creation, and yet our society often seems incapable of weaning ourselves off of the fossil fuels that are driving it. Of particular concern is the disproportionate effect on those living in poverty and in the least developed countries, the elderly and children, and those least responsible for the emissions of greenhouse gases.

In 2018, the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church-USA recognized that our mandate to care for God's creation extends beyond being good stewards as individuals, and calls us to advocate for policy changes at the national and international level that will promote a transition to sustainable sources of energy. Fortunately, we are not alone in this struggle. People all across the political spectrum are recognizing the urgency of the situation and the need to work toward solutions.

Citizens' Climate Lobby, <u>www.citizensclimatelobby.org</u>, is a non-partisan, grassroots organization dedicated to building the political will for climate-change solutions. It promotes a carbon fee and dividend approach, which is recognized by PC-(USA) as an effective and socially just way of accelerating the transition to a clean-energy economy.

Boy Scout Memorial Fund Plaque

The Memorial Fund was created in 1985 after the unexpected deaths of two long time Troop 306 leaders. Funds were sent to the Troop by their family and friends in appreciation of their service to Scouting at Catonsville Presbyterian. The Troop Committee, with advice and input from their families, decided to create a separate fund to provide resources to Scouts who needed financial assistance to attend summer camp. The fund also provides youth with the recognition of dedicated service by deceased members of the Troop Committee or Troop leaders. A Memorial Plaque contains the names of former leaders and committee members since its inception. The fund accepts donations from former Troop members, families and friends of the deceased, and others who support the outdoor Scouting program. We've never had to turn away a Scout from attending summer camp. Scholarship assistance is strictly confidential between the Scoutmaster and the family requesting assistance. A new updated plaque was recently purchased and presented at the Scout Family Dinner in February. There are quite a few familiar Catonsville Presbyterian names on the plaque. Donations were recently accepted to honor and thank Mike McDonal for his 10 years of service as our Troop Committee Chairman. Upon his "retirement" from Troop 306, Mike requested this type gift instead of a personal one. Our thanks and appreciation are extended to him for his leadership and service to Scouting.

Session Meeting Highlights

The Session is a body of fifteen members, elected by the congregation and ordained as ruling elders, who provide leadership for our congregation. Following are highlights of the regular monthly Session meeting on February 5, 2020.

- The Session meeting was led by Associate Pastor Dorothy Boulton, as our usual Moderator, Ken Kovacs, was at the Jung Institute in Zurich Switzerland taking examinations for practice certification.
- The Finance Committee reported that the year is off to a good start, with a budget surplus at the end of January.
- Session discussed the question raised at the Annual Meeting about the monthly church school class for the 4 to 7 year-old-children during worship. This question will be the subject of continuing study by the Christian Education Committee.
- Session approved the Mission Committee's request to send \$2,000 remaining from the Puerto Rico trip funds to Camp Guacio, where our work trip participants stayed while in Puerto Rico.
- Session also approved the Mission Committee's request to send \$3,000 in GRACE Mission Funds to Presbyterian Disaster Assistance for

ongoing recovery work in Puerto Rico and elsewhere.

Session approved naming Cynthia Schwanz as the Session representative on the Nominating Committee, and requested that they present a slate of nominees for the 2020 Nominating Committee at a special meeting of the congregation called for the purpose of electing the nominees on Sunday, February 23, 2020. The Nominating Committee so elected will develop a slate of church officer nominees for a congregational meeting to be called for late March, 2020.
