On All Saints' Sunday (November 1) we will gather around the Lord's Table and take comfort in knowing that we are indeed surrounded by multitudes, by "so great a cloud of witnesses" (Hebrews 12:1). We share in the life of the risen Lord and the risen Lord holds us together with a love that will never let us go. By the power and presence of the Holy Spirit we're bound to Christ and to one another, which means that we're close to those who have gone on before us. The old hymn says it best: "O blest communion/fellowship divine!/ We feebly struggle; they in glory shine; yet all are one in thee, for all are thine. Alleluia!"

The first followers of Christ knew that they participated in the resurrection-life of Christ. We hear this theme in the opening chapter of Colossians: "May you be made strong with all the strength that comes from God's glorious power, and may you be prepared to endure everything with patience, while joyfully giving thanks to the Father, who has enabled you to share in the inheritance of the saints in light. God has rescued us from

the power of darkness and transferred us to the kingdom of God's beloved Son, in whom we have redemption, the forgiveness of sins" (Col. 1:11-14).

Worship on All Saints' Sunday is always a moving experience. This year—a year of so much pain, suffering, death, loss of all kinds, and accumulated grief—it will be especially tough hearing the names of loved ones invoked in the service. Add to our heavy hearts the stress, anxiety, and deep concern we have for our divided nation on the eve of the general election, it feels as if we are living through our own kind of "great ordeal" these days, enduring much. All the more reason for us to unite our heavy, tired hearts and minds in worship, in prayer, in the breaking of the bread of life, in sharing the cup of salvation, knowing that we are not alone, remembering who we are and whose we are and who goes before us. So let us gather at the Lord's Table: *Lift up your hearts*. Lift them up to the Lord. Let us give thanks to the Lord our God. For it is right to give our thanks and praise. Alleluia! Alleluia!

We also collected food items, including all the Thanksgiving trimmings, to help these families have a complete holiday meal.

This year, the Catonsville Can ministry will be holding a big "Fill this Truck" event on Saturday, November 7, from 8 am to 2 pm, at the Knights of Columbus on Frederick Road. The goal is to collect

Christmas At Sea

We will again be collecting gifts for seafarers, but because of the pandemic, several things have changed. The Seafarers Center currently has limited volunteers or staff to deliver gifts boxes, the gifts should be placed in one gallon ziplock bags, instead of shoe boxes. This will also make it easier to store gifts for next Christmas if changes in contact restrictions make it impossible to deliver them in a timely manner.

This effort will be even more important this year than usual. Christmas is always a lonely time of year for seafarers who are far from home, but because of pandemic-related restrictions on international travel, many of them have been away from home for longer than usual. And because of concerns about a covid-19 outbreak on board ship when they may be far away from medical treatment, most of them have not been permitted to have shore leave for many months. It is therefore even more important than usual to let them know that their efforts to keep the world economy functioning are appreciated.

You can either purchase the items yourself and place them in a one gallon ziplock bags, or make a cash contribution and the Mission Committee will purchase items. In order to be able to practice social distancing to the extent possible, members of the Mission Committee will be filling and assembling the bags, rather than making this a congregational effort as in the past. There will be a bin on the porch of the church house to leave filled bags or items to be placed in bags. If you would prefer to make a cash contribution, either send a check to the church office or make an online donation through the CPC website at https://catonsvillepres.org/support-us/.

Items that are welcome include a warm hat, gloves or mittens, socks, toiletries, postcards of Baltimore or Washington scenes, small calendars, or puzzle books such as Sudoku that are suitable for those whose native language isn't English. The Mission Committee will provide paperback New Testaments. Please-no food items. We will be collecting items and donations through November.
