## One Year Later

ne year ago this weekend we suspended in-person worship and closed down the church building (except for the Child Care Center, recovery support groups, and the counseling center) to "reduce the curve" and help stop the spread of the COVID-19 coronavirus. The global pandemic had arrived in the United States. Almost overnight, everything was rescheduled, postponed, canceled, or moved to an online platform, such as Zoom. Life changed quickly and it felt as if the world, itself, had come off its axis. Fear and anxiety started to rise as we self-isolated ourselves to care for family, friends, and ourselves. On March 15 we had our first makeshift prayer service from the sanctuary, which Susan Krehbiel recorded live on her iPhone.

## **One Year Later**

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It was only going to be for two weeks, but then it extended to a month, then three months, and another three months and...here we are one year later. And what a year it has been. Facing enormous challenges, we've had to be creative, adaptive, and look for silver linings in an otherwise terrifying situation. It's been exhausting. And the grief, sadness, and sorrow that we've experienced, both directly and indirectly—there are no words. No one has been left untouched. In our congregation over the year, we lost three members to COVID and we have many members who have lost family and friends, and we've had many more church members that have tested positive for COVID and recovered with little or no lasting symptoms.

This Sunday in worship (March 14, Second Sunday Zoom) we're going to mark the one-year anniversary of the pandemic's emergence in our lives. We invite you to have a candle available to light during the service. We will remember those we have lost. We will remember and honor those that have died throughout the country. We'll honor and give thanks for doctors and nurses and healthcare workers who were and remain at the front lines in this battle. We will give thanks for science—the fact that we have not one but three highly effective vaccines available in just under a year and that now ten percent of the country has now been vaccinated is nothing short of a miracle. The fight isn't over, of course. There could be challenging days ahead if the spread of the virus variants gets out ahead of the vaccination rate and if people start letting their guard down and stop wearing masks. But hopefully, thankfully, we are beginning to see the light at the end of the tunnel.

During Lent we have been reflecting upon and exploring the question: what does love look like? Rooted and grounded in love, the Session, at the March meeting, voted to extend our current worship and building use policy through the end of June. We know that people are eager to get back into the sanctuary, to be together, but we feel that the time is not quite right. We're almost there. Now that the weather is improving, we will be planning additional outdoor worship experiences (not as a substitute for Sunday worship) and other activities on the church grounds (maintaining safety protocols).

Dorothy Boulton and I are truly grateful for the ways the congregation has demonstrated the love and kindness of Christ throughout this past year. We're thankful for the wise guidance of our Pandemic Task Force, as well as for the strong, faithful, adaptative leadership of the Session as we navigated uncharted waters. We have learned and are learning much about ourselves as a community of faith during this crisis, and these learnings will no doubt shape the future ministry of CPC in profound and potentially transforming ways. - How do we get past emotional barriers to real forgiveness?


# Easter in the Woodlands

# **Dismantling Racism**

Free the Vote on Monday, March 22nd at 7 p.m.

Join the Dismantling Racism Committee in viewing and discussing the documentary *Free the Vote* on Monday, March 22nd from 7–8:30 p.m.

The United States is one of the only democratic nations that strips voting rights from felons, both while incarcerated and, in many states, even after. This disproportionately disenfranchises Black Americans in the criminal justice system. *Free the Vote* is a documentary that explores the racist roots that led to this current system, and the injustice and inequity of denying the right to vote to millions of people who are incarcerated. This story is told by people who were formerly incarcerated, scholars, politicians and advocates.

They discuss their experiences and the importance of every voice, particularly the marginalized, being heard. This new documentary by the ACLU of Maryland focuses on stories of directly impacted people of Maryland.

### Food Ministry

# Sacred Space Garden

### Purchasing Engraved Pavers

In the February 20 edition of the Messenger we highlighted the Sacred Space Garden and Columbarium and introduced the option to purchase an engraved paver. Here are the details. Pavers will be available to order from March 1 thru May 15. This will ensure that the construction company will have these pavers ready to be used in the construction process which will begin summer 2021. After May 15, 2021 additional paver orders for the Sacred Space Garden will be welcomed, encouraged, and added periodically as needed. At that time, it will necessitate removing plain pavers and inserting the new ones. So, if you know now you want pavers, please order by May 15, 2021 so they may be included in the original design.

The pavers are 8-by-8-inch gray concrete that can be engraved with up to 6 lines of writing (20 characters per line counting spaces). The actual writing on the pavers should reflect the grace and dignity of the Sacred Space Garden. Paver text will be reviewed and approved prior to engraving.

## Sacred Space Garden Paver Order Form

You can fill out the form below or you can layout your own paver to visualize how it will look by visiting Polar Engraving at <u>www.polarengraving.com</u> and selecting Services then choose Virtual Brick Creator. Select 8 by 8, text only (no logo), brick color number 7 gray, any font. You will no longer be able to add letters when you reach the maximum number of 20 spaces and letters on each line. All the garden pavers will be printed using Optima font but this is not an option when you try to visualize your paver on the website.
