

# Holy Week and Easter

For the first time in two years, we will be back in the sanctuary for Holy Week and Easter services. Thanks be to God! We are grateful that the COVID positivity rate in Maryland continues to decline, hovering around 1.5%. As a result, Session has relaxed the COVID restrictions. Beginning Sunday, April 3, masks are optional, there are no capacity limits for rooms in the main church building, and food and drink are allowed, provided the Maryland COVID positivity testing rate remains at 1.5% or lower.

#### **PALM SUNDAY**

### APRIL 10

### **MAUNDY THURSDAY**

### APRIL 14 AT 7:30 P.M.

Jesus said, "I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another" (Jn. 13:34). On Maundy Thursday — from the Latin, *mandatum*, meaning "mandate."—we reflect upon Jesus's final words for his disciples. We will gather for the Lord's Supper (in the sanctuary) and continue with a service of Tenebrae (darkness) as we listen to the Passion of our Lord according to John's Gospel.

#### **GOOD FRIDAY**

#### APRIL 15 AT 6:00 P.M.

We will gather outdoors—either round the labyrinth or the pavilion—for a contemplative service of music and readings considering the meaning of Christ's crucifixion.

#### RESURRECTION OF THE LORD

### **APRIL 17 EASTER SUNDAY**

Join us for a Festival Service of Praise as we give thanks for God's gift of new life. Our text for the morning will be John's account of the resurrection, the only Gospel that tells us that Jesus was buried in a garden. Mary Magdalene confused Jesus, at first, with the gardener—this is not an insignificant theological detail for John. And we will gather at the Lord's Table and encounter Christ's real presence in the breaking of the bread and sharing of the cup. *Christ is risen!*

## THE RUSSIAN-UKRAINE WAR

# A Crisis of Orthodoxy

Adult Education on Sunday, April 24 at 9:00 a.m.

The Russian invasion of Ukraine on February 24, 2022 is a historic threat to people of the Orthodox Christian tradition. More troubling still for Orthodox believers, the senior hierarchy of the Russian Orthodox Church has refused to acknowledge this invasion, issuing instead vague statements about the necessity for peace in light of "events" and "hostilities" in Ukraine, while emphasizing the fraternal nature of the Ukrainian and Russian peoples as part of "Holy Rus'," blaming the hostilities on the evil "West," and even directing their communities to pray in ways that actively encourage hostility.

On March 13, 2022, in response to the Russian Orthodox Church support of the war, leaders of the Orthodox tradition released an extremely significant statement – **A Declaration on the "Russian World"** (*Russkii* Mir) Teaching – which is being compared with the Declaration of Barmen (1934), the Confessing Church's denunciation of National Socialism in Germany. The religious dimension of the war hasn't received the attention that it deserves.


## **LENT IN PLAIN SIGHT**

## EARTH CARE CONGREGATION

In 2015, Catonsville Presbyterian Church formed the Creation Care Team with the encouragement and support of the Interfaith Partners for the Chesapeake. Soon after, we began a series of projects to establish our church grounds as an example of sustainable garden management.

In 2016 we applied for certification as an Earth Care Congregation under a special program of PC(USA) to recognize congregations working in grounds, worship, and education to promote environmental stewardship. We have been recertified each year since our original certification!

Our projects are transforming our wonderful church grounds into spaces for worship, meditation, learning, and fun. We have planted over 140 native trees, created several native meadow areas, and planted of hundreds pollinator attractor plants. We have created several new gardens and replanted old ones. The project of reclaiming and restoring our lovely woodlands sanctuary area is a cornerstone of our efforts!

# SESSION MEETING Highlights from March

Your Session continues to meet monthly and is using Zoom to meet online in view of the coronavirus pandemic restrictions. Following are highlights from the Session meeting on March 9, 2022.

- The Finance Committee reported the theft of a computer from the church office. Measures are being taken to restore the lost data and an audit of financial systems is planned. For the Operating Budget in the year to-date, a budget surplus continues due to the pre-payment of annual pledges by some members.
- The Envision Board presented a draft of changes to the Envision Guidelines as a result of recommendations from the Envision Task Force last year. Session voted to approve the changes.
- With the continued reductions in the COVID reporting metrics for the state of Maryland, Session is requesting that the Opening Up Task Force consider further relaxing of COVID restrictions in the church buildings. It is hoped that masks can be made optional when the testing positivity rate drops below 1%, however, congregational singing is still a concern.

Session recognizes the need to continually communicate with our membership, and we welcome your suggestions for communication exchange. Session member contact information is listed in the Church Directory, so it is easier than ever to communicate directly with your church leaders.
