Yes, you read this correctly. Michael is a recently ordained Minister of Word and Sacrament in the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) and member of the Presbytery of Baltimore, who sees communication as ministry.

A graduate of Belmont University and Princeton Theological Seminary, Michael comes to us with considerable experience working with more than half a dozen churches, individuals, and faith-based organizations over the past two years to streamline and strengthen their communications and operations. He has experience building and maintaining websites and is conversant in the world of social media. Michael's theological training enables him to bring spiritual and missional reflection into the work of communications and the operations of the church. He has experience as a church administrator and, in his first interview with us, offered a beautiful theological reflection on what happens in the day-to-day running of a church office.

Michael recently served as the Operations Manager for Evolving Faith (evolvingfaith.com), an organization that is committed to building community and hope in "the wilderness" through its annual conference, podcasting, live streaming, and digital platform. Working with Evolving Faith, Michael constructed a visual identity and brand from the ground up before managing the creation of an online community space which hosts nearly 9,000 members.

At Princeton Seminary, he served on the staff of the Office of Digital Learning, developing the Seminary's online learning capacity and leveraging technology to heighten student success. Michael helped faculty and students implement technology in their fields through personal training sessions and developed an online resource for congregations committed to the inclusion of LBTQ+ Christians.

One of his references, Rev. Melissa Martin, pastor of the Hopewell Presbyterian Church in Hopewell, NJ, shared with us that because Michael sees communication as ministry, he thinks visually and theologically about images and words, about how and what is conveyed to the congregation, and how to link this with the mission of the church. Commenting on the uniqueness of the CPC position, which combines communications and the administration of the church office, Melissa said, "CPC has the opportunity to be cutting-edge, envisioning the future ministry of the church, and moving beyond the way it's always been done. I commend you for it. I wish I had someone like Michael to help us this way at Hopewell."

Away from work, you will find Michael playing piano, exploring Baltimore, and enjoying a round of trivia with friends.

Michael is working with the Presbytery's Committee on Ministry to ensure that his position at CPC will be considered a Validated Ministry (which is required for pastors who are not installed in congregational ministry). Michael's ministry and responsibilities will be concentrated in the area of communications and managing the office. He will not have any other pastoral responsibilities as part of his job, although I'm sure you'll see him in worship or the pulpit now and again.

Michael started working with us on January 3, 2023. The position is full-time, however, the office hours will remain, for now, Tuesday through Friday from 9:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. You may reach him at the church during office hours or via email, mcuppett@catonsvillepres.org.

A Note From Wendy Johnston

Wendy Johnston is the Organist and Assistant Director of Music at Catonsville Presbyterian Church. She is a graduate of the Peabody Institute of The Johns Hopkins University and has directed children's singing groups, worked with adult choirs, and taught numerous piano students in her private studio.

First, a huge thank you and round of applause for our children who sang in the family service on Christmas Eve. They sang beautifully and added to the joy of the worship service. Thank you to Owen and Deacon Flis, Clara and Zinnia Hall, Ryan Long, and Julian Wyatt. Thank you to their parents as well—who played an enormous role in the success of our fledgling children's choir—and to Paige Peercy who made it extra special by singing a descant with the children. We can look forward to another appearance of the children's choir in the coming months.

I thought I might share a little about me and my journey to this congregation and in becoming the Organist and Assistant Director of Music at CPC. Several years ago, I attended a recital given in honor of my organ teacher at the time, Dale Krider, who was retiring. The guest organist gave a splendid recital and at the conclusion of the performance, he played the hymn *O God*, *Our Help in Ages Past*. The congregation stood shoulder to shoulder and sang with full voice while the virtuoso organist played not merely the music, but also the text. As each verse grew in grandeur,

the text and the music melded to become one entity. There is no other way to describe it. The singing transformed into worship. Despite the fabulous music that was played earlier during the recital, no one could stop talking about the hymn and the shared experience we had at the end.

For me, it was a pivotal experience. I suddenly saw how an organist could facilitate true worship, and I wanted to provide that experience for others. This experience was a catalyst in my subsequent decision to return to school for undergraduate and graduate degrees in organ performance. I hope that in my work at Catonsville Presbyterian that I can provide meaningful worship experiences for you.

As a side note, the guest organist who played that recital that day was Dr. John Walker. At the time, I had no idea several years later, Dr. Walker would be my beloved teacher at the Peabody Institute. Today, he is my mentor and friend.



The Personnel Committee reported on a smooth transition in the church office, as the new Communications and Operations Manager Michael Cuppett has settled in. Session will hold a planning retreat at the church on a date in March to be determined by a poll of the Session members.

The Finance Committee presented the year-end financial report for 2022, which ended with a surplus of \$7,711. A balanced budget of \$833,305 was presented for 2023, which also recommended a 4.5% COLA for all staff members as encouraged by Baltimore Presbytery. Session voted to approve the budget as presented, with the pastors' Terms of Call to be approved by the congregation at the Annual Meeting on January 22, 2023.

Even in the midst of winter, our thoughts wander to Spring, the excitement of returning plants, and the joy of gardening!

This is the time to research and plan for next season. The Maryland DNR has a wonderful resource available at <u>tinyurl.com/native-chesapeake</u> to assist in planning.

Over the past seven seasons, the Creation Care Team has worked to create and develop the church's gardens into gardens primarily consisting of native plants. Additionally, we have reclaimed and restored the woodland area by creating specific habitats for native meadow grasses and flowering native plants and shrubs.

We continue to plant a variety of native trees, both canopy and understory. So far, we have added over 150 trees to the church grounds.

In the coming season, we will continue to partner with several community groups and contractors to further develop these areas of the church grounds, enhance their educational value, increase their use for recreation, and to provide special places for quiet and mediation.

Artists4ERA

In 1987, Congress declared March as National Women's History Month. As a way to acknowledge the contributions of women and recognize the 100-year struggle to ensure equality for all, five organizations are teaming up, including Catonsville Presbyterian Church.

On March 3, AAUW Maryland, the Maryland Women's Heritage Center, Dismantling Racism Committee of Catonsville Presbyterian Church, Grace AME Church, and Christian Temple are hosting Artists4ERA, an art exhibit developed to bring a renewed awareness to the Equal Rights Amendment (ERA). The exhibit will include the work of iconic artist Shepard Fairey, known by many for his Women's March collection and his viral depiction of Barack Obama. The artwork depicts diverse groups and communities in their struggle to enshrine equal rights in the Constitution, including LGBTQIA+ people, Black women, women of color, Indigenous peoples, and young people.

"As gender rights are rolled back across the country and as the Supreme Court signals its willingness to forgo precedent, a new generation

of activists is stepping up to the fight. Art as a form of expression has a unique way of motivating people and we are deeply grateful to all the artists who contributed to this project," said Kati Hornung, Executive Director of VoteEquality.

Tickets for the exhibit reception are free and can be reserved through Eventbrite. The reception will be hosted by the Baltimore County Arts Guild at the Catonsville Clubhouse on March 3 from 6:30 p.m. to 9:30 p.m.. The purchase of limited edition, signed prints will financially support VoteEquality, an organization working to ensure that the fully-ratified Equal Rights Amendment is enshrined in the U.S. Constitution.

February 5: Mission Update with Jennifer Bentzel

We welcome back Jennifer Bentzel, Foundations and Partner Relations Manager with Corus International/IMA World Health. Jennifer will talk about the merger of IMA and Lutheran World Relief and their new integrated programming. She will also provide a presentation and update on the Yemen Mobile Health Clinics project, which received a \$42,000 Envision grant in 2022. This project is providing critical primary health care services to Internally Displaced Persons (IDPs) who were forced from their homes due to the ongoing conflict in Yemen and are now living in camps in Marib. Yemen continues to suffer through one of the worst humanitarian crises in the world, due to widespread hunger, disease, and attacks on civilians. And Jennifer will provide an update on how CPC's mission giving continues to have a positive impact, particularly in Nepal and Tanzania.

We welcome back Bonnie Harry, RN, Director of Catonsville Emergency Assistance (CEA). It's been a busy and challenging year for CEA, with new challenges, as well as exciting new possibilities, on the horizon in 2023.
